

When I receive reports from the three aircraft restoration projects at Committee meetings and when I walk around the hangar and observe our volunteers working, I am struck by their care and thoroughness. We received the good news that work on Hangar 1 should start soon after spring commences in September. It has been a long road getting to this point, so we look forward to seeing progress soon.

Liberator, hangar activities

Progress continues with the restoration, including the readjustment of the flying transition control box and reinstatement of some items in the bomb bay. There has also been discussion of the fitting of the nose wheel.

Oxford, hangar activities

Now that the team has more material on hand, the construction of the rear fuselage is proceeding more swiftly. The rudder fin parts are nearing completion and await assembly.

Anson, hangar activities

Work on the nose cone is progressing, and the turret mechanism is almost ready for sandblasting. The timbers for the windows were not quite right, so the windows need to be removed and the wood underneath them replaced before the windows are refitted.

Electrical section activities

The Navigator's Radio Compass Indicator mounting frame has been completed, the compass fitted to it and the assembly installed in the aircraft. The Navigator's Radio Compass Control Panel mounting plate has been manufactured and mounted in the aircraft. The team is now searching for the actual control panel so that it can also be fitted.

The bomb bay bell is complete and will be installed when an exact mounting position has been decided on and the holes drilled.

The battery charger for the engine starting batteries has been repaired and put back into service.

Components are gradually being added to the forward compartment so that it can be an easily accessible viewing area for visitors.

Fuse Box No. 4 had heavily corroded fuse connections, and work on these is continuing. Once it is ready, along with the installed refurbished bulkhead 4 terminal strips, the team will be able to finalise the wiring for the bomb bay lights.

Meanwhile, one member of the team is spending most of his time on a Cheetah IX engine (for the Anson or Oxford, not for the B-24 Liberator).





Hangar 1 Project progress

At a meeting of Stakeholders at the hangar on 6 August the Melbourne Water representative reported that they have a preferred contractor, that the contracts will be signed within about a month and, once that is done, work on Hangar 1 should begin within two weeks. This is good news for us: there should be visible progress soon! Certainly, road work has been progressing on Dutchelm Avenue behind the hangar, and we expect the entrance to the expanded museum precinct will eventually be from there.

Heritage Collection

Following a Committee decision to approve the purchase of new storage cupboards for items in our Heritage Collection, we now have two of three cupboards assembled, and the Acquisition Committee has established a careful labelling of all storage areas. Thank you to volunteers who assisted in assembling the cupboards.

Marketing

One of our volunteers continues to work with the Institute of Engineers Australia Heritage Victoria to have the badly weathered marker from outside the hangar replaced. It seems that a solution to the problem of producing a display that will withstand the elements has almost been solved.

The enclosed Hangar Shop Product List is the second list designed to inform you of the merchandise we have for sale and how to order. You may also notice if you purchase, e.g., a new beanie, that some products have a slightly different logo; we considered it apt to update our branding to reflect our museum status and location. We shall move to this for all relevant items in the shop as we need to order new stock.

Updated Five-Year Plan 2024-28

Committee recently approved an amended forward plan for the B-24 Liberator Memorial Museum. We agreed that we should limit it to five years (rather than the previous ten), because that seemed more realistic and in line with the planning needed for our museum precinct expansion once we have Hangar 1 in 2027. Volunteers are continuing to clean up in and around the hangar, and there are now regular working bees. The emphasis is on disposing of non-aircraft parts.
